

Decision-Making on Post-Separation Child Custody – Preferences and Experience of Parents

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Introduction: Physical Custody in Czechia

- Ca. 40% of marriages end in divorce*
- 60% of divorcing couples have minor children*
- Over 20 thousand children every year affected by a divorce*
- Statistics do not include separations of unmarried couples
- Ca. ¾ of children entrusted to the care of the mother
- Shared custody used increasingly often since the end of the 1990s

Introduction: Physical Custody in Czechia

- Discussion among the professional and lay public often emotional, based on personal opinions and myths
- Public opinion x results of foreign studies (Braver and Lamb, Bauserman, Nielsen...)
- Czech research missing, foreign research not known
- Experts call for independent research



Research description

 Project Impacts of the rate of parental conflict on children and the role played by post-divorce care arrangements

 Carried out by the Research Institute of Labour and Social Affairs

 Map the circumstances of the break-up of married and unmarried couples and its effects on the care and raising of children



Data / information sources

- Consultations, interviews and focus groups with experts
- Secondary data analysis
- Qualitative interviews (parents, young adults)
- Public opinion research
- Questionnaire survey with parents caring for minors after the break-up



Survey design

1982 respondents

- 985 men and 997 women who have a minor child
- lived with his/her biological father/mother in the same household for at least 3 months
- at least 12 months have passed since their divorce / breakup
- they take care of this child or have regular contact with him/her

53% sole custody and 47% equally divided care

62% married, 38% unmarried


Care arrangement defined based on the number of nights per month spent by respondent

Data collection August – October 2021



Initial preferences of parents






Generally accent on the division of care before the breakup and on the well-being of the child



Reasons to prefer own sole custody

I decided to give in to the other parent if not, my surroundings might resent me it improved my negotiating position I was afraid I would feel loneliness the child could otherwise blame me I wanted the other parent to pay alimony I wanted to avoid arguing I doubted the other parent was able to I mostly took care before


Parents prefer their own sole custody when...

- The child is very young
- Their partnership was complicated and conflictual
- They differed on the division of care for the child and / or the methods of education
- Some of these problems appeared in the household: financial problems, long-term unemployment, violence, addictions
- They didn't have a new partner at the time of the breakup, but the other parent did
- They were not married
- Are religious
- Have a lower educational attainment (at least one without secondary school-leaving exam)



Reasons to prefer shared / joint custody

I wanted to pay less (or no) alimony I decided to give in to the other parent if not, my surroundings might resent me I wanted to have time for myself I wanted to avoid arguing it improved my negotiating position the child could otherwise blame me we both took care of the child before I wanted to participate fully in parenting I found living with both parents important


Parents prefer shared custody when...

- The child is older (school age)
- Both parents agree they should end their relationship
- They were married
- They are atheists
- Have higher educational attainment (both at least secondary school-leaving exam)



Reasons to prefer partner's sole custody

if not, my surroundings might resent me the child could otherwise blame me it improved my negotiating position I wanted to have time for myself the other parent took mostly care before I thought the care would be difficult I wanted to avoid arguing I decided to give in to the other parent it was the best solution for the child




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7 - it played no role at all

Fathers' and mothers' preferences




52.5% of respondents had the same preferences as their former spouse, 47.5% differred on the choice of physical custody

Agreement more often were shared or joint custody is preferred (sole custody more controversial)




Reality – Division of care at present





Changes over time






Especially if the child was aged 0 - 6 at the time of the separation

Conclusion

When choosing a care arrangement, parents consider the division of roles (and especially care) before the separation

Mothers: sole custody x fathers: shared / joint custody

Intensive conflicts and pathologies → sole custody

Youngest children → sole custody of the mother, but this arrangement may be later renegotiated
